# Starry, Starry Night ...

A group of a dozen hardy WACC photographers gathered at Bethanga Bridge on the night of Monday 18<sup>th</sup> May (a new moon night) for a Landscape Astrophotography workshop conducted by Mark Slater. Preparation is the key to success for such a shoot. First of all, warm clothes (fleece, jumper, beanie, gloves and for some, thermals) are essential. Secondly, it is important to be familiar with your camera and navigating your way through its menu and around its settings. It can be very frustrating making adjustments to your camera in the dark (even with a torch) if you're not confident about doing so in daylight. Apart from your camera, which ideally should be a full-frame capable of shooting at a high ISO with minimal noise, you need a wide-angle lens (somewhere between 14mm and 24mm is ideal) with fast glass (a low f-stop such as f2.8, f 3.5 or f4), a remote shutter release and a sturdy tripod. A fully-charged battery and/or spare are essential.

It is important to know how to: set your camera to Manual mode; change the ISO (between 1600-3200); set the white balance to 3800K; change

the shutter speed and aperture in Manual mode; set your focus on your lens to manual (this is best achieved during daylight hours by autofocussing on a distant object and noting where the camera sets the focal distance on the lens) and identify which shutter speed best suits your lens based on the 600 Rule (shutter speed = 600/focal length of lens).

The Bethanga Bridge provided an interesting foreground for our photographs of the stars. A silhouette of a tree, windmill or an old building would be an equally suitable foreground. Some of the resulting images are shown below. Many thanks to Mark Slater for organising the workshop and sharing his wealth of knowledge of Landscape Astrophotography.

#### **Suspended Banana**

"Suspended Banana" by David Willis is very simple to do in Photoshop, Elements or similar software program. All you have to do is follow David's simple steps:

Take a photo of the background image. Camera mounted on a tripod; natural lighting; Step 1 Exposure: 4 sec, bias +2 step, f-stop: f16, ISO: 100 and spot metering.

Peel a banana, cut into sections and thread onto a skewer; prop it up in the air, and Step 2 photograph it: Exposure: 1.6 sec, bias +1.3 step, f-stop: f8, ISO 100 and spot metering.

Step 3 Make a selection of the banana, copy and paste it onto the background image. Tilt the banana as required and flatten the layers. Clone out any odd bits.
