MONOCHROME: (1.1) A black and white work fitting from the very dark grey (black) to the very clear grey (white) is a monochrome work with the various shades of grey. A black and white work toned entirely in a single colour will remain a monochrome work able to stand in the black and white category; such a work can be reproduced in black and white in the catalogue of a salon under FIAP Patronage. On the other hand, a black and white work modified by a partial toning or by the addition of one colour becomes a colour work (polychrome) to stand in the colour category; such a work requires colour reproduction in the catalogue of a salon under FIAP Patronage. (FIAP)

MONOCHROME: (1.2) An image is considered to be Monochrome only if it gives the impression of having no colour (i.e. contains only shades of grey which can include pure black and pure white) OR it gives the impression of being a greyscale image that has been toned in one colour across the entire image. (For example, by Sepia, red, gold, etc.) A greyscale or multi-coloured image modified or giving the impression of having been modified by partial toning, multi-toning or by the inclusion of spot colouring does not meet the definition of monochrome and shall be classified as a Colour Work. (PSA)

MONOCHROME: (1.3) A black and white work fitting from the very dark grey (black) to the very clear grey (white) is a monochrome work with the various shades of grey. A black and white work toned entirely in a single colour will remain a monochrome work able to stand in the black and white category; such a work can be reproduced in black and white in the catalogue of a salon under FIAP Patronage. On the other hand, a black and white work modified by a partial toning or by the addition of one colour becomes a colour work (polychrome) to stand in the colour category; such a work requires colour reproduction in the catalogue of a salon under FIAP Patronage. (The Photographic Alliance of Great Britain)



MONOCHROME: (1.4) Any photograph containing shades of only one colour. If toning is carried out, it must be over the total photograph - partial toning and/or the addition of one extra colour is not acceptable in a monochrome section. (APS)

MONOCHROME: (1.5) Is where each position on an image can record and show a different *amount* of light, but not a different <u>hue</u>. It includes all forms of <u>black-and-white</u> photography, which produce images containing tones of neutral <u>grey</u> ranging from <u>black</u> to <u>white</u>. Other hues besides grey, such as <u>sepia</u>, <u>cyan</u> or brown can also be used in monochrome photography. In the contemporary world, monochrome photography is mostly used for artistic purposes and certain technical imaging applications, rather than for visually accurate reproduction of scenes. (WP)

MONOCHROME BLACK & WHITE: (1.6) A greyscale image with a wide or narrow range of tone from black to white. In colour discipline it is also known as neutral colour or achromatic hues. (APJA)

MONOCHROME COLOUR: (1.7) A colour image ranging in brightness tone/value across a single colour and may include sepia, cyanotype and subtle nuanced variations of these. In colour discipline it is also known as quality contrast. (APJA)

Remember Black and White images require more contrast then a colour image as they require a large tonal difference between the blacks and whites to make them pop.

The image is reasonable well exposed with only very minor highlight clipping around the very edges of the cap and sleeves. I would suggest that you try to bring up some of the details in the dress and also brighten her face compare to the rest of the image. This is a good image that can be improved by a little post production editing. 193 Resting 11 Place pts An interesting image of a diesel electric train. I like your use of the rails as leading lines taking the viewer eye through the image. The image appears flat because it has a limited tonal range, mostly in the grey range. With black and white images can push the contrast further than colour giving that differentiation. Here I would suggest that you increase your exposure and contrast to get a more dynamic image; I would also suggest that you back off on the sharpening as this has caused some pixilation to occur and some halos around the train roof and bridge in the background. A good image that I think would work better in colour. Seeing out the past for this Timorese gent 14 Place pts Another nice portrait that works well in monochrome. I like the close crop to highlight and centre the face. You have very good contact between yourself and the gentleman which gives the image a very intimate feel. I would suggest next time to have the gentleman step a little further away from the wall as this will help isolate the main subject further by blurring the background more. Well done on a good portrait.

An interesting concept blurring the image top and bottom to create a kind of window effect. The buildings are sharp through the centre of the image and the exposure is well handled. This image works well in monochrome. You have created interest from your low shooting perspective. I would suggest that you straighten the image during post production as it appears to dip on the left. Well down on having the courage to experiment.

148 Honeyeater on Grevillea 12 Place pts Merit

A good image of a bird on the grevillea. The eye of the bird is sharp and it even has some catchlights in the eye. The complimentary colours between the bird and the flowers work well. I would suggest that you darken the background as the bright green leaves are very distracting.

A well captured image of an elusive subject.

11 119 Turning a Profit

Place pts This image is all about story! I love the Smokey atmosphere you have created with some very good use of lighting using the smoke to tell part of the story. I would suggest that you add a vignette to the image which will minimise the impact of the bright area, top right, and the posters, behind the man's right shoulder.

This is worth submitting to the VAPS or National contest.

Tawny Frogmouth Owls

This image demonstrates how well camouflaged these birds are. You have captured a sharp image which is surprising given that you have used only 1/160s shutter speed instead of the more conventional shutter speed of around 1/300 s, although some top bird photographers talk of using 1/1000s or higher. I guess it's a testament to the ability of the Olympus stabiliser system. Bird photography is always difficult as you cannot have the birds where you want them; in this case the blue behind the top bird is distracting and if you can I would suggest cloning some leaves in behind that bird. I like your use of the square format.

13 195 Little Church on the Lake

An interesting, courageous almost upside-down concept placing only the sky reflection at the bottom. The sky has some beautiful texture in it and the image gives me a feel that you are not sure what should be the main focus, the sky reflection, the church or the cliffs in the background. The human eye is drawn to the bright areas in an image, so in this image the eye is drawn to the cliffs or the bright spot on the right-hand side of the sky reflection. I would suggest that you crop the sky reflection, possibly to a square format, brighten the church and darken the cliffs a little; this will draw the attention back to the church. This is a very interesting image that can improve with a little editing.

01 In My Glory

Stunning image of a bird. You have controlled the DOF well to isolate the bird from the background. The image is sharp which is a surprise as most top bird photographers recommend a 1/1000s shutter speed, you have used 1/250s. I see that you have used an aperture priority mode which many bird photographers use but care must be taken when photographing birds with white on them and I recommend underexposing the image. Here you have lost detail in the white on the bird's neck and the top of the beak. This is a lovely image and maybe in the RAW format you might be able to bring back the detail.

15 10 The Cattlemen's Posy

This is an interesting image in that it could one of two images with the flower or the hut as the focal point. Because of the name I will use the flower as the focal point in which case this stands out from the rest of the image as you have used the light well to highlight the main subject. Using the good Zeiss lens has enabled you to capture a sharp image from the foreground to the background, although the very bright sky through the trees tends to draw your eye away from the main subject and I would recommend that you darken this area somewhat. This is a nice image that can be improved with a little editing.

146 Flinders

Craneaux's Tree made famous by Harold Crazneaux an Australian photographer who died in 1953. You have shot this a beautiful time of day, the golden hour and the light really makes this image, particularly against the blue of the hills in the background and sky. The image is sharp throughout and you have placed the main subject in a position of power. I like the low horizon as this emphasises the height of the tree.

This is a beautiful landscape!

113 Satin Bowerbird (Male)

Very good image of a satin bower bird. The main subject is well separated from the background and is well exposed. You have a good connection with the bird and the image has not distractions, however the image appears a little flat and this can be corrected by making the bird a little brighter allowing you to see more of the plumage. Great image that is worth including in a photobook.

EDIMA Monochrome - (Section 'A')

1 198 Lilydale Lake

12 pts Place

This image reminds me of some of Edward Weston's images. The grass works well as a monochrome with the dark background to highlight the grass. I like the panoramic framing of the image and the compositional layout in general. The grass is out of focus and it does no feel that it is deliberate, this may have been caused by the 417 x 1920 format causing a pixilation problem to occur. If it is not consider adding more blur and turning this into a fine abstract image. I really like the concept behind this image.

2 194 Into the Wilderness

14 pts Place Merit

Your either channelling Peter Dombrovskis or Michael Smith, either way this is a great story telling image with lovely moody weather. Your main subject is sharp and therefore stands out against the soft moody background. On the high-grade photographic monitor, the man's back appears too dark but on a low grade monitor you can see the details in his shirt. I would consider lifting the exposure or shadows slightly if you are going to print this image otherwise the print will be a little dark. Congratulations on a fine image.

3 78 Truckies Talk

11 pts Place

A nice photojournalistic image that gets the viewer asking the question, what are they talking about. The off-centre placement of the men unbalances the image slightly as does the large negative space on the right. The man on the left has his front and face in shadow so I suggest that a better shooting position would have been to your left so you would have more of the left mans face shown and this I think would have been a stronger image.

4 81 Lake Phewa

11 | pts | Place

A lovely lake scene from Nepal. The main interest being the people in the boat, even though they are small. We talk of weighting in images, people carry the greatest weight, followed by animals, human construction and nature; this is what your eye is attracted to first. I like the people being place centrally in the image as this tends to balance the image. I find the hull of the boats a bit under exposed, this can be remedied by increase the luminosity of the shadow slider in lightroom. You have some amazing scenery in the background and the boats are usually very colourful which makes me think that this image would be better in colour.

5 43 The Old Waterwheel

12 pts Place

I like the off-centre framing of this image as this adds to the story. The main subject is sharp, well exposed and works well in black and white. The eye tends to try and escape toward the bright clouds on the horizon which you may consider reducing the brightness a little. I like the low shooting perspective as this enhances the size of the wheel.

6 163 Zig Zag Groyne

These structures are always interesting to photograph. The groyne provides a very good leading line in this image but the line does not lead anywhere. I suggest that you could get rid of the sky and most of the horizon to make a stronger image. I would recommend that you have a look at Jim Worrall's work to give you some idea.

As you can see in this image, he has deleted the horizon to make the image all about the groyne which now becomes a subject instead of just a leading line.

Your image has the possibility of becoming a striking image, I would suggest that you crop severely, lighten the shadows so you see more of the details of the posts, then enter it in a state or national comp.

A very moody morning for a drive. I like the way that you have used the leading line of the road to be the main subject as well. The negative space helps to retain the eye on the road as does the dark bushes on the left. The foreground is sharp and is well exposed for this image. You may consider lifting the exposure level in the shadows but that is a personal creative choice. A good image that would work well in a travelling book.

A beautifully exposed, sharp image of a dog going for a walk with His/Her slave. I like the central leading line as this drags the viewer into the image along with the walkers. I think the slight vignette helps to maintain the viewer's eye on the main subject.

A beautifully composed and composited image at first you think the image was shot with the light coming through rain covered window. This image ticks all of the boxes!



148 Happy 12 Place pts Yep this gentleman is certainly happy! I love the expression on his face. You have used the available side lighting very well to create this image; the main subject is sharp with good eye contact with the camera. I however find the bright background distracting and I would recommend that you soften it so that it has less impact on the main subject. I really do like his smile!! 119 Plying the River 13 Place pts I like the high key nature of this image! Many judges would dismiss it as over exposed but I think it works well and highlights the main boat very well which stands out from the lighter background. The image is sharp throughout as is necessary for this type of image. You have framed the image nicely. Well done on having the courage to experiment. pts | Place 68 Outback Queensland An outback scene that appears to have been taken in the early morning. The track around to the tower provides a good line into the image and directs the attention to the sunrise. I would suggest that the image be cropped on the left to eliminate the bit of a vehicle and most of that part of the image does nothing for the image as a whole. Sunrise and sunset shots usually rely on their colour and converting them to monochrome generally does not work. This image has potential and with a little thought can be an interesting image. 195 Harold the Helicopter pts Interesting that this image should come to me now for judging! This is an aerial shot with a very simple palette of essentially white with the main subjects in black. This image makes use of the strong leading lines from the lower right through to the upper left, there are two others not so powerful from the right centre to the left centre. I'm ignoring the distraction in the bottom left corner as this can be cropped out. Interesting I said in that I have just been reading a very good article on leading lines: https://www.picturecorrect.com/tips/how-to-capture-leading-lines-that-work/ In this image the lines at the top of the image tend to draw the viewer out of the image and away from the subject. I like the simplicity of this image and think that it works very well in monochrome but I also think that you need to make it simpler still. I also like the vastness of the image with the large area of snow and the small helicopter. Alenia Aermacchi M-346 12 pts I like this image of the plane just taking off. You have nice texture in the sky and the plane is sharp. The trees provided a good grounding and provide some context to the image. Henri Cartier Bresson spoke about the decisive moment in this image you are either too early or too late as the wheel is only partially up and looks out of place. I hope you were using burst mode when photographing this as maybe another image will have the wheel up or down. This can be removed in editing software like Photoshop but it does take some skill. I like the placement of the image within the frame. This is a god image. 15 10 Skeletal 13 **Place** Merit pts There is some nice late evening light and great cloud texture in the image. You have placed the main tree on the thirds line to give it some power and balance against the negative space on the left. The dead branches provide added texture and story to the image. The background is a little busy and an F stop of around 4 to 5 instead of 11, would have given you a shorter DoF and blurred out some of the far dead trees. The light, texture and clarity of this image make it a very good image. 16 146 Winter Storm 13 Place pts A very moody image that uses the 3 trees as a leading line to the hero of the shot, the cloud. The bright spot over the centre tree has lost all detail and I would recommend that you clone that out as it is distracting and drags the eye away from the main interest. While your cloning I would suggest that you clone out the strip, left bottom and the clump, centre bottom of the image as these are distracting as well. This is a good image that can be improved and I suggest submitted to the ABC weather channel or their annual weather calendar. 113 I'm Out of Here 13 Great image! I like the placement within the frame allow the bird to move. The image is sharp with the bird being well isolated from the background by a good choice of aperture. In this image the differentiation between to tonal range of the bird and the background is not great and the bird is in danger of being lost; in a colour image this would probably not occur but in a monochrome I would suggest that you lighten the bird and lighten the eye even more and this will make it a very strong image.
