Howlong – Photography Workshop

On Sunday 17th March our Club held a morning of workshops that explored three different styles of photography. The event took place at the Memorial Park in Howlong alongside the River. It was the ideal venue that provided plenty of space for us to set up lighting equipment and props.

Members had the opportunity to explore ICM (Intentional Camera Movement), Macro and Portraiture. We were fortunate to have Eliza Nichols modeling for the portraiture photography. Thank you to Louise Peacock for asking Eliza who was a terrific model and very obliging in assisting us on the day. Helen Bishop provided examples of images and suggestions of a number of poses. We created different looks for our model as she willingly donned a variety of hats and scarves. Making use of our surrounds, we captured more natural looking shots of Eliza surrounded by fallen leaves.

Consideration had to be given to the lighting as we tried a variety of effects such as side lighting through the trees, allowing the shadows of leaves across the model's face and then posing the model in shade and using reflectors to bounce light back. It was interesting to observe the different mood that could be conveyed by lighting. Artificial lighting was also experimented with thanks to David Woolcock bringing along his setup and range of triggers for us to try. These lights achieved some very pleasing results.

David Woolcock (Wooly) and Neville Bartlett assisted members exploring macro photography and various compact off camera lights. In camera focus stacking was explained and plants were used as props.

The surrounding trees were well suited to ICM with Yvonne Schnelle and Bill Cleverly assisting members with this creative technique. David Skinner had provided a useful handout explaining ICM. Neutral Density Filters were available to assist in reducing light to allow for longer shutter speeds to enhance the effect.

The hands on workshops were a good opportunity to get together as a club and try out a few styles of photography that we may not often do. For example, ICM can be a way to open up new creative possibilities in your photography and learning the basics is all that's required to get started. Very little equipment is required and mobile phones can also achieve good results.

Thank you for all those who took part both assisting and participating. We hope you enjoyed the morning, learnt some different techniques and got some inspiration with your photography. There is a very good variety of photographic knowledge within our club and having events such as these is a great way to share this.

28th April 2024 9am to 12 noon


COST: \$5 per member (The cost is to cover the room hire and materials)

- 4. Tripod


What you will learn:

1. Smarties under glass & oil




You will get to eat these samples when we are done

You've got a nerve! (a word from the editor)

Recently I was using a late model Canon Mirrorless Camera and when trying to retrieve the Raw images from the card – Computer says no... Seems that there is a new type of CR file that needs a late model computer and not my outdated dinosaur, so how do we future proof? DNG could be the answer. Why convert to the DNG format? This is from The Adobe website: Unlike most manufacturer-specific raw formats, the Digital Negative is an openly published specification that not only is supported by Adobe, but is also freely available for other software and hardware vendors to support. Consequently, it can be a safer file format to use for long-term archival purposes. Archiving your file as a digital negative eliminates worries that the raw file will no longer be readable once the camera format that created it becomes obsolete. Thanks Woolie for this Tip

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
